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

WV Governors Early Intervention Interagency Coordinating Council (WVGIEICC)



The WVGIEICC was established in 1987 in compliance with the federal regulations governing state early intervention systems that address the needs of infants and toddlers, ages birth to three, eligible under Part C of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). These regulations require each state to establish a state interagency coordinating council to advise and assist the lead agency in the development and implementation of the Part C statewide system.

In West Virginia, the lead agency is the West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources (DHHR), and the system is administered through the Bureau for Public Health, Office of Maternal, Child and Family Health. While the WVGIEICC provides advice and assistance to the lead agency with the planning, implementation, and evaluation of the WV Birth to Three system, the lead agency has final authority in the administration of the state system.

Membership and participation of parents, practitioners and community partners is valued and the expertise they bring to the Council is important to the success of the WV Birth to Three system. Their assistance has supported DHHR in a redesign of the early intervention system in 2004 and continuing to ensure the WV Birth to Three system provides high quality services and supports. All professionals are enrolled through the state system and operate across the state. Financing is centralized at the state level, coordinating access to Medicaid, WV CHIP, and State and Federal Part C funding. WV Birth to Three must use Federal Part C funding as funding of last resort.

Of special note, WV Birth to Three has been found to be "meeting requirements" as established by the Federal Office of Special Education since the inception of this rating system in 2006. This determination is based on WV Birth to Three's performance against compliance indicators, quality of data, and the quality of services and supports provided to eligible infants, toddlers, and their families in the places they live, learn and play.

Council meetings are held five times a year and are open to the public. Time is set aside at each meeting to hear from guests. This time is designed for the Council to learn from stakeholders, to celebrate and recognize people, services and/or community activities which further best practice in the field of early care and education, as well as to hear comments and concerns regarding services and supports in the early childhood community.

Council Activities

1. Assist WV Birth to Three with State Systemic Improvement (SSIP) Work
 - Serve as key stakeholder group for guidance, review and analysis of data and exploration of improvement strategies
 - Provide guidance and oversight to SSIP Implementation Teams via review of work to date and participation on teams
2. Assist WV Birth to Three with development of publications and documents
3. Provide advice and assistance with the development, implementation, and evaluation of initiatives, projects, and procedures
4. Collaborate with early childhood partners to educate and support children, families, caregivers, and professionals to
 - Strengthen partnerships across early childhood programs by sharing information and resources
 - Partner with WV Infant/Toddler Mental Health Association to maintain the resource component of their website (<https://teamwv.org/west-virginia-infant-toddler-mental-health-association/wvitmh-resources/>)

Every Child Deserves a Good Start



WV Birth to Three is a statewide system of services and supports for children under three and their family who have a delay in their development or may be at risk of having a delay. WV Birth to Three supports are provided at no cost to families.

WV Birth to Three is administered through DHHR's Bureau of Public Health, Office of Maternal, Child, and Family Health in partnership with the WV Governor's Early Intervention Interagency Council to assure that family-centered and community-based early intervention services are available to all eligible children and families.

Who is Eligible for WV Birth to Three?

Any infant or toddler under age three who is experiencing at least one of the following:

- Medical or developmental diagnosis (i.e., Down syndrome); and/or,
- Developmental delays:
 - Cognitive – thinking and learning;
 - Physical – moving, seeing, and hearing;
 - Social and Emotional – feeling, coping, and getting along with others;
 - Adaptive – doing things for themselves;
 - Communication – understanding and communicating with others; and/or,
- Risk of possible delays due to biological and/or family stressors.

Benefits of Early Childhood Intervention Progress





Cost Benefits of WV Birth to Three Services and Supports

Intervention is more effective the earlier in life it can be provided. Research has estimated that for every dollar spent on early intervention there is a \$7.00 savings for public education which translates to an approximate 13% return on investment per child in the first year of life (Effectiveness of Early Child Programs, ECTAC, 2018 and ROI Research Kit, Heckman Equation, 2017).
